

# Just can't

The class rep plays an essential role in the FODH. The Annual spoke to three mums, who have done the job more than most, about why they keep coming back

#### Shirel Stemmons

#### When were you first a class rep?

We had just moved here from London in 2001. My daughter Sophie was in Transition at Bevendean - she's now doing her A levels!

#### How many times have you been a rep?

At least 13 times out of the 15 years we have been at Danes Hill. I've also been the Upper School Trustee. But I've never repped for two classes at the same time.

# What have you enjoyed most about being a class rep?

When I came to Danes Hill I didn't know anybody and through being a rep I have made lovely lifelong friends. You have a connection to the strong sense of community within the school and you feel more involved with the children's education.

# What part of being a rep have you found the most frustrating?

It used to be really awful when you had to manually write the class lists. I used to have this huge sheet and you would be inputting every last detail by hand! And chasing people for their contribution to the kitty.

# What three words would you use to describe Danes Hill?

Love. This. Place. There is such a vibrant sense of community - a real sense of belonging. When I first came to look at the school the kids looked so happy and I thought 'They must be doing something right'. It's really being part of something special and I will cry my eyes out when I leave!

# If you could change one thing about the school what would it be?

Making sure half terms fit in with all the other local schools because many families have siblings elsewhere.

# What advice would you give to someone repping for the first time?

If you're considering it, definitely do it. It is the best way to get to know the school and the parents.

If you've decided to do it, try not to do too much - not too many socials every term. It's really important to find out what your class want so have a coffee morning, ask them and take it from there.

#### What makes for a good class rep?

You have to be enthusiastic even when no one else is! You must want to do it, have a positive attitude and care about doing it.

# What made you go back to do the job of rep again and again?

I want to be involved in my children's school lives and those memories. Friends of mine often say 'Why are you taking more on? Why don't you step back?' But I want to do it and my kids love it.

#### What is a rep's most important job?

There are two different jobs and they are both important. One is connecting with the FODH and communicating their business to the class and getting people involved in events. The second is organising the social side - connecting to the parents and helping them connect with each other.

#### When were you first a class rep?

#### How many times have you been a rep?

When were you first a class rep? Ten years' ago! 2006.

#### How many times have you been a rep?

I have helped out in some way every year that my son Jack has been at Danes Hill. Mainly as class rep but I've also helped with Lost Property, the Charities Committee and once as Secretary of the FODH.

## What have you enjoyed most about being a class rep?

I love being involved and by helping out I have got to know the school really well and have made some great friends. It's fun helping at the events, I've done everything from manning the bar, to selling burgers and cakes, and counting bounces for the bounceathon! I have really enjoyed getting to know the staff behind the scenes, including the ground staff and catering team, who do so much to ensure school life runs smoothly.

## What part of being a rep have you found the most frustrating?

#### What makes for a good class rep?

A friendly, organised person, who just gets things done. A good communicator - someone who can be persistent when they need to be and does not take things too personally (like nobody reading her emails!).

# What made you go back to do the job of rep again and again?

I like keeping in touch with what is going on at school. Being part of the FODH has given me a good understanding of the school and I feel very comfortable communicating with staff members.

#### What is a rep's most important job?

There are two. The first is to pass on information to the parents in their group in a timely manner, and the second is to encourage parents to meet up socially once or twice a term.

#### What makes for a good class rep?

Someone who is enthusiastic, opinionated and is interested in their child and the school. You need to attend the meetings tool

# What made you go back to do the job of rep again and again?

A few times it was because nobody else volunteered, but generally I like to be involved.

#### What is a rep's most important job?

Reach out to new people in the school who are in your class. They will benefit the most from your support and might have lots of questions. Sometimes they don't even know what they don't know in such a busy school like ours. Send out a contact list and try to arrange a few mostly simple, not overly costly events through the year.













#### What part of being a rep have you found the most frustrating?

Where you have to ask for volunteers for something and nobody volunteers; but then everybody volunteers at the end. It's that period between asking and right before the event where you're stressing out! But everybody always comes through.

## What three words would you use to describe Danes Hill?

Intense, Social, International.

# What advice would you give to someone repping for the first time?

Communicate with people but avoid sending too many emails. Try to host a few simple, fun events to get people together. Enjoy getting to know the parents and their children.








# Never can say

The Annual speaks to the staff who just can't seem to stay away from Danes Hill about their time at the school and what has made them come back.

#### Carly Holzer, Religious Studies

Which three words would you use to describe Danes Hill?

Bustling. Happy. Fun

## What are your top three memories of your time here?

Firstly I would say a memory from my school days here at Danes Hill. We used to have to ring the school bell by hand, and it was situated above where the headmaster and teachers used to park their cars. One break time I was the one ringing the bell, and it fell and landed on Mr Gough's car. We also had little hand bells and used to hang out of the windows and ring them.

#### Quiz question: Does anyone know where the original bell is situated now at school?

As a teacher I loved going on the Normandy trip and visiting all the beaches. And finally I remember a year when snow disrupted many of the Christmas productions. On the day many children could not get to school and others had to fill in for them. One little girl was saying the lines of the person who had not arrived and instead of saying frankincense she said Frankenstein, which led to much laughter from the audience and us in the wings.

#### When did you leave Danes Hill? How has the school changed during the time you were away?

Having taught at Danes Hill for a few years, in 2013 I left to travel, and arrived back in November 2015. While I was away new buildings were built and the school seems bigger. Having said that, the family ethos is still here, as well as a wonderful sense of community. Just as an example of how strong the

sense of community is, my mum still gets together with a group of friends from my brother's year three class!

#### What did you do while you were away?

Originally when I left I had planned to

go to Australia. However, during the summer I met my husband-to-be and so delayed my trip. Eventually I did get to Australia and then met up with my now husband in the USA. We came back to the UK in January 2014 to get married and then moved back permanently from the USA last September.

#### What were you looking forward to when you knew you were returning? What did you miss the most?

I really did miss teaching while I was away, and could not wait to get back into the classroom. Being away cemented the fact that I love to teach. On my return it was great to see so many familiar faces and see how the children I had taught before had grown up.

I missed the camaraderie in the staff room, school lunches, summer BBQs and getting involved in all the different activities and trips.

#### How do you think the school will change over the next few years?

Hopefully we will have a lovely new sports hall. I remember when the Ark was built and how exciting it was to move from The Old Stable Block (part of which still exists today as the Music department) to the Ark.

#### If you could change one thing about the school, what would it be?

I would love to take the fences down.
I know it is not possible in the interests of keeping the children safe,
but I used to love looking out of The
Rookery classrooms onto the field.
The children could run straight out of
their classrooms onto the grass.

# If you hadn't been a teacher, what would you have done instead?

I would have gone into Outdoor education. I took a gap year after school and worked at a children's camp in Australia - I really loved it. In the end I felt that teaching as a career had more longevity.

#### If you could teach another subject what would it be?

At the moment I teach RS and am really enjoying that. I also loved being a generalist teacher – teaching in the lower and middle school across all subjects.

#### What were your school days like?

I was a pupil here and I was one of only six girls in my year. I loved school and my memories are all of a fun, happy, unstressful time. I remember having an afternoon break and only having clubs on one night a week.

We all used to do our homework straight after school, at school, so I seldom remember doing any homework at home. My favourite teacher was definitely Mrs Parfitt, she was my form teacher in both my first and last year at Danes Hill.

#### Sonal Chatrath, Learning Support

#### When did you arrive at Danes Hill?

In 2006. My husband and I had just moved down from London where I had owned a nursery school. I originally covered a maternity position as Head of Nursery at Bevendean, but was offered a permanent place after that, at first in learning support, then in the Lower School and finally, I was the Head of Transition for four years before I left.

# When did you leave Danes Hill? What did you do while you were away?

In 2012 I moved to Manor House School to become the Head of Preps, running their pre-prep programme. I stayed for three years.

#### What were you looking forward to when you knew you were returning?

I joined Danes Hill in 1995 as a parent when my eldest child started in Transition. I have always had a passion for horticulture. Just as I was about to



start my RHS course in 2002, Mr Parfitt convinced me to come and teach D&T at Danes Hill on a part-time basis. I remember him showing me the floor plans for the Robins building and when it eventually came to fruition, Mr Murdock asked me to head the D&T department. I was instrumental in introducing Food Tech to Danes Hill. With the help of the FODH we started our kitchen garden, which the children and I love planting each year. Most fruit and vegetables are available all year round, but the garden helps children to learn about seasonal produce.

The main changes have been in the number of children at the school, the increased pace at which everything moves and the traffic!

# How do you think the school will change over the next few years?

I really hope that the Sports Hall finally gets planning permission.

I think one of the big challenges facing Danes Hill going forward will be the increase in senior schools accepting children at 11+ and how that will change the shape of prep schools.

#### If you could change one thing about the school, what would it be?

I would have a shorter school day - even if it meant slightly shorter holidays.

#### What key memories do you have of your time here?

Mr Murdock getting swiped off his feet in Alpe D'Huez while taking photos of the children bum boarding. Watching Andrew McCallum score 100 runs. Being involved in first team rugby and witnessing great teams emerge over the seasons.

#### When did you arrive at Danes Hill? How has the school changed since?

I arrived during the summer term of 2003 and had a few weeks to familiarise myself with the school before starting on a one year contract in Sept 2003... which turned into 12 wonderful years at the school.

#### What will you miss?

The children. I was lucky enough to teach at all ability levels and I loved seeing each and every child progress. The children that I taught when I first arrived at Danes Hill are now 28 years old. I found it very humbling to see the response from my ex-pupils when I left Danes Hill, some of whom have turned into world class sportsmen.

### What are some of your signature phrases?

Catches win matches. Score more goals than you let in. Hit, stick so the next one rips.

# If you weren't a teacher what would you have done instead?

I would have been a surfer. I love surfing and travelling. Perhaps I could have been a photographer travelling the world following the surfers and making surfing movies.

# What would your advice for the children at Danes Hill be?

Remember that enjoying what you are doing is number one. Give it all you've got, and your best does not always mean you will be the winner. However, if you have given it your best, in your heart you will have succeeded.

#### If you could go back in time who would you most like to meet?

Robin Parfitt. I would like to thank him for believing in me.

# What is your best memory of your time here?

Definitely the Isls of Wight trip - it was fantastic. I loved seeing how the children grew in confidence day by day.

#### What will you miss about the school?

School dinners. The busyness of the school and constant interaction with people.

# What are you looking forward to doing once you leave?

I am finally taking a leap into the world of gardening. I am signed up to do my RHS qualification and will be opening my own business in July called Gardening Angel, helping people in their gardens.

# If you weren't a teacher what would you have done instead?

Horticulture. When I left school I had secured a place to do a horticulture qualification but was put off by others who said that 'girls don't do horticulture'. One of the things I love about the D&T and Food Tech department at Danes Hill is that it has managed to eradicate any gender biases with both Mr Taylor and I teaching across both rooms, and boys and girls alike enjoying everything from sewing to woodwork.

#### Susie Williams, Head of History Which three words would you use to describe Danes Hill?

Nurturing, Busy, Wonderful.

# What key memories do you have of your time here?

I had a year group of girls who won the national netball finals. Thereafter, a group of mums invited me around to their house and made a real fuss of me. They had put together a video of the highlights of the season, there were speeches and they gave me cards and flowers from all the girls. I could not believe they had gone to so much effort just for me.

And the class run that I organised with my form last year. All of the families gathered together in Bushy Park on Mothers' Day, in freezing cold conditions, to raise money for Comic Relief. It was very special. Oh, and we had hoodies made (of course!).

#### What words of wisdom do you have for the children you have taught?


Your life lies before you like a path of driven snow, be careful how you tread it 'cause every step will show.


